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IN AND AROUND WOOLACOMBE

Like most of the southwest, Woolacombe's an awesome place to surf and explore, hence it's stacked high with holidaymakers in summer. The busy town's nestled among north Devon's wild landscape and is a colourful contrast to the sleepy old villages that surround it. Whatever the season, it's the kind of place where there'll always be somewhere open to shelter from the scorching sun/pounding rain and there's plenty spots to eat, drink and sleep, alongside walking routes galore. If your mood's more inclined to the sleepy village feel, look to the teeny-tiny Mortehoe, just a few minutes from the town; there's not a lot more to it than a village shop, a fish and chips stop and a couple of pubs, but there are ample places to spend the night.



TO DO

It might sound peculiar that one of the top things to do around here is hang out in a parking area, but give it a go and you'll soon see what's up at the **Marine Drive Car Park** (19). The long stretch of roadside parking borders pretty much the length of the beach, and is the ideal place to spend the day, check the surf, read your book and hang your wetsuit out to dry for the next session.

If Woolacombe's main beach is too exposed for you, pop around the corner to **Barricane Beach (20)**, where you'll find more shelter for sunny snoozing or a picnic, and rockpools for the kids to play in. It's a popular spot, though, so don't expect it to be peaceful on a sunny day.

Hop onto the walk to **Morte Point** (21), which the locals believe is so wild that 'Morte is the place that heaven made last and the Devil will take first.'



From the point you'll have an incredible view of Lundy Island and there are secluded smugglers' coves along the way, where you'll likely see lazing seals. If your boots are made for long walks, continue along to Bull Point and the lighthouse, there's a circular route that loops back through the countryside.



Find out a bit about the area in the little but lovely **Mortehoe Museum** (22). Run by local volunteers, entry's free but donations very gratefully received. There's all sorts of information about shipwrecks and local history, and a play area outside for small people. You can also book a tractor ride out to the point from here if you're not feeling hikey.

Kids and adults alike adore the Borough Farm Sheepdog and Falconry Displays (23), held on Wednesday evenings from May to September. Perch on hay bales and tuck into a sunset BBQ while the sheepdogs show off their skills, then for afters you'll be astounded by the magnificent birds of prey performance. And there's no letting wet weather stop the fun - if it's raining you can watch the displays from the shelter of the barn. Each Tuesday there's an interactive Farmyard Show for the little ones, and on Thursdays there's a 2 hr tour on the clifftops called the 'Shepherding

Gobblebox (24) is a tiny street food takeaway situated down a side street off the main beachfront. Crab dogs and mackerel tacos are on the specials board as well as the much-loved chicken dishes. Veggie and vegan options also. Whatever you choose it's sure to be full of flavour, and the sauce selection is something more to rave about. Open from midday. Closed in winter. *£*

Miss Fea's Café (27), underneath the Smugglers Rest B&B in Mortehoe, is appealing whatever the weather; the terrace and garden are ideal on sunny summer days and it's the perfect place to drink hot chocolate by the wood-burner if you want to shelter from stormy weather. You'll never need to go to the supermarket again. Well, at least not for the duration of your stay here. If it's in summer. Closed in winter.

Mike Taffinder Woodcrafts (30) hides down winding roads lined with high hedges, and enough corners and junctions to make you feel like you slid down a rabbit hole. His glorious showroom and workshop are at his house, where you'll be warmly welcomed by Mike, his wife and his pack of friendly dogs. Craftwork for sale includes oak mirrors, candle holders, beautiful chopping boards and towel holders; all will instantly look right at home in your kitchen (or van). And check out his dragonflies, made from solid wood they balance as if by magic on their noses upon everything from gate posts to fingertips. His passion and dedication to his work come across clearly, and you'll be glad you stopped by. His opening hours aren't fixed so it's worth phoning before you visit.

SLEEP

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North Morte Farm Caravan and Camping (31) may be the campsite with the best view ever. They don't take advance bookings for camping so just turn up and pitch up in one of their fields overlooking the sea. The site's a short walk from the beach, the pub and the village store, and you can drive to Woolacombe in a few minutes for a surf check. There are also static holiday cabins and space for caravans and motorhomes. Open March to October.

You'll find Little Roadway Farm Camping (32) along the narrow lane that connects Woolacombe and Croyde. They say they welcome "Tents, caravans, camper vans, motor homes, pods, trailer tents and anything quirky," so don't be shy if you're travelling in alternative style. There's also a choice



of bell tents and glamping pods, and a shop and takeaway on site. A family-run, family-friendly site, close to the beaches and with lush countryside walks in all directions. Open all year.

centre of Mortehoe. A friendly welcome, fresh and modern décor, comfy beds, hot showers en suite and a good breakfast downstairs in Miss Fea's Café. Dog and child friendly. Open April to October.

We like **Gordon's Cabin** (34) for its little cottage cosiness, sitting in the countryside with an over the fields and between the hills view of the sea. Just round the corner from the beach at Woolacombe, it sleeps 2, has an enclosed garden and is dog friendly. Having started out as a linhay (farm building) in the 1800s, this little cabin's now a bright and modern space, keeping the traditional high ceilings and beams. SHOP

Hartland's village centre has a little hive of art workshops, potteries and galleries (60) where you can find beautiful works of art and locally made unique crafts. In the summer as part of the Annual Art Trek, local artists open studios to visitors. Out of season, pop to the Parish Hall to check for any popup art events.



On the first Sunday of each month between March and December, you

can hop along to the **Hartland Farmers Market & Café** (61) at the Parish Hall to find fresh local produce, everything from seafood to meat and cheese, veggies and bakery goodies.

SLEEP

Stoke Barton Farm Camping (62)

is located between Hartland village and Hartland Quay. A big site, it accommodates lots of tents and vans, and the lovely local family who run it are a fountain of knowledge on the area. Farm dogs, footpaths to the beach and a little shop on site (selling bacon, sausages, burgers and pasties from the local butcher, alongside your essentials) makes this place feel homey. Loveland Farm (63) is a creative, magically peaceful eco-retreat where sustainability comes first, just a 5-minute drive from the centre of Hartland. With a choice of 6 incredible Geodesic domes and 3 'tentipis', all

offering stylish simplicity and comfort, from stargazer ceiling and wood-burning stove to a projector for movie nights. Each pod has its own private shower room, there's an indoor swimming pool (heated with reusable energy) and communal fire pit, BBQ area, top notch food available to order, and even the eco toilet 'thrones' have sea views! 

Slap in the middle of village and seaside, with a short walk to whichever you treasure most highly, you'll find Coastal Cabins (64) delightful wooden huts at a stunning lakeside location. Choose from a selection of all en suite cabins, each has a kitchenette and its own decking area and outdoor seating. SURF

The coastline of north Devon, mainly rocky and dramatic, takes a break for an occasional long sandy break here or there, offering a pretty fine choice of reef, point or beach break and ensuring there's something for everyone.

Woolacombe (I) may get packed but with it being an expanse of west-facing beachbreaks you'll probably find a peak to yourself. Backed by dunes and picks up any available SW, W and NW swell, works at all tides. If the wind's from SW or S try Putsborough, at the south end of the bay with good shelter from Baggy Point. • All levels/sand/ample parking/surf school and surf shop/toilets/restaurant/campsite. •

Croyde Beach (II) can get crowded but is well worth having to wait your turn on a good day. Works on all tides but best shape at low, ranges from



fun beginner waves to shallow barrels. Needs small to medium SW, W or NW swell. Offshore with an E. • All levels/sand/ample paid parking/surf schools and hire/toilets/café and shops/campsites. •



If it's firing too fast at Croyde, head to **Saunton Sands** (III). Another lovely

long beach with slow walls. Great for beginners, popular with riders of longboards, fish, mid-lengths and single fins. We love the right at the north end of the beach. Works at all tides with a small W, medium SW or NW swell. • All levels/sand/ample paid parking/surf schools and hire/little shop/café/campsite nearby. •

Westward Ho! (IV) is the only town ever to exist with an exclamation mark in its name so that's enough to make it worth a visit, right? Packed in summer and the holidays, easy wave for learners as it usually lacks power. Works throughout the tides, in small to medium W swell. Offshore on an E. • Sand/beginners/ample paid parking/facilities/surf schools/caravan parks. •



SCHOOL RENTAL REPAIR

Surfing Croyde Bay (65) aka The Little Pink Shop is one of the oldest surf shops around here - the first one in Croyde, it's been family run since 1987. They've boards, suits and surf accessories to buy and surf rentals - you can pop in or pre-book your rentals online to maximise your time in the water and save any faff. Open all year.

SEASIDE LOCAL: ARTIST & ILLUSTRATOR CLARA JONAS

Dreamy Clara Jonas is an artist and surfer with a love of the ocean, coffee, and almond croissants. She likes to spend her days outdoors; be it dog-walking, surfing with friends or swimming in the sea, intertwined with creating gorgeous artwork and laptopping.

You're likely to find Clara in the Box and Barber coffee shop in Newguay, at picturesque Schooners on the beachfront in St Agnes, or keeping a low profile in the Lidl bakery section. When escaping the screen she's often wave sliding; "I'm by no means a super intrepid surfer, and don't have the head for sussing out cool, crazy spots. On a happy, low key day, when the wind is light and the waves a happy size I'll probably head to Gwithian or perhaps Watergate. Who knows, it depends on who I am with and how the day is unrolling." You may have spotted her illustrations in Wavelength magazine, on special edition Origin Coffee products or in collaboration with local swimwear brand, Love and Honor. Clara tells us that all her artwork stems from words. It started with calligraphy and brush lettering and quickly evolved. "The words come from everywhere." explained Clara, "Conversations, song lyrics, poetry. I'm intrigued and inspired by spiritual philosophy, folklore, and mythology. A lot of my work is founded on cues within these subjects. Trying to make an ephemeral feeling that is hard to put into words a visual is what makes me happy." Her work infuses with some of her ideas on life, the universe and being human; "I won't be surprised if my work looks totally different in a year, or even a month. We are always so in flux as beings and I try to be quite intuitive with where I head creatively, as opposed to judging it, or worrying about things being on brand or what others expect."

"Being so close to the water and nature does position living in a slower, more sustainable way, perhaps as more of a focus. The people and the space that it brings to your life can't really be filled by much else. Creatively, being able to express some of these feelings and connect with people is what drives me and my work. And of course, surfing itself is an endless source of inspiration, from the history to the modern culture, and particularly women in the sport." Even though Clara has spent the majority of her time studying, drawing, and surfing in Cornwall, she isn't ready to settle down just yet. She has a big old list of things to do, dreams to chase. "Cornwall will always be special to me and somewhere I feel comfortable and at ease, but I think I'm overdue some personal growth and need a change of scene to keep that flow going. I'll have to see how that unfolds..."

The working dairy and agriculture farm offers English language courses to students who stay in the farmhouse, and recently opened their Shepherd's Huts Glamping Site to extend their accommodation offerings to those who enjoy a rural stay with comfort and style. Rougey Lodge (73) is a surfy hostel offering dorm-style and private rooms. The communal area's a great hangout

to meet fellow travellers. Next to surf lessons and hire they organise SUP and bike tours and coasteering adventures, so there's plenty 'nuff to do for your non-surfing buddy, or on flat days. Another good budget option in town is the **Turf n Surf (74)**. Either stay in one of the private rooms or a shared room, bring your own surf gear or rent it. You can book lessons, or, if you're looking for something else to do - from kayaking to climbing, cliff jumping to partying - there are options galore. Intermediate and advanced surfers can book surf tours to discover different spots with a guide, like the multiple-day Peak Tour or the Reef Tour. 

Sleep in a cosy cottage, a retro caravan, a yurt, or a treehouse. Teapot Lane Glamping (76) has all the aforementioned. All options have a charm of their own, but a treehouse is, you know, a house in a tree... and how extremely cool is that. It comes with a private compost toilet and electricity, and has room for 3 grown-ups. (But why would you want to bring that friend if it can be just you and your love, right?) Don't get all sobby if the treehouse is taken - the yurt, caravan and cottage are far from punishment. They all add a romantic, outdoorsy and slow-down feel to your holiday. The communal wooden sheltered seating area is where you can meet up and stay for hours, sharing stories and snacks with other Teapot glampers. The treehouse and cottage are open all year, yurts between April and October. ◆€€◆
